



## 1. Corowa's and Urana's Community Strategic Plans



The vision identified in the Corowa CSP is:

We are a community built on our strengths – our natural beauty, our land, our opportunities and our people.

We embrace and celebrate our rich history; whilst at the same time continue to be excited in our plans for the future.

We are inclusive, welcoming and compassionate. We are deeply committed to protecting our families, our environment, and our economy.

We are a great place to visit, to live and to enjoy. We are the choice.



The vision identified in the Urana CSP is:

To preserve and enhance the lifestyle of our communities by encouraging, promoting and facilitating the sustainable development of the shire.







Based on Census data, the Federation Council area has a low rate of growth, having increased in population by only 0.4% since 2006 (compared to NSW's overall increase of 14.2%). Further, it has a high and rapidly-rising median age of 49 (compared to NSW's overall median age of 38), having increased by 11.4% since 2006. This suggests there may be need for more strategic focus in the Federation's retention and attraction of young people, building on the Corowa Shire *Community Strategic Plan's* objective 1.1.2: "A place of diverse opportunities and resources for young people" (p. 12). Moreover, the data suggests there may be need for more focus on the support of positive ageing.

Federation's LGA fastest growing segments appear to be residents who identify as Aboriginal Australian (32% increase since 2006), and those of culturally- and linguistically- diverse background (5% approximate increase since 2006). This suggests there may be emerging opportunities and challenges relating to inward migration, multiculturalism, and social cohesion and integration.

## 3. Phone Survey Findings

#### Overview

Overall, the survey had 225 respondents, and achieved a demographically and geographically representative sample at the 95% confidence interval with a margin of error of 6.5%.

## What do residents value most about the Federation Council area?

The Federation Council is particularly valued for its natural environment (particularly the Murray River), country lifestyle (particularly its tranquillity), and its strong community spirit. It is also valued for its community and other services, its close proximity to other centres such as Albury and Melbourne, and its parks and recreational opportunities.








Overall, respondents' top ten words to describe their vision for the Federation Council area are as follows:

- Community (n=10)












## What are the highest priority issues facing the Federation Council area?


















