MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR - PAT BOURKE

Dear Readers,

Welcome to the June edition of the Urana District Newsletter.

Its been another very busy month since I last wrote the May column, and its pleasing to see that whilst there has not been anywhere near enough

rain as yet, there have been some minor falls that are keeping things green, and providing some hope across the district of being able to get some crops this season.

Council Budget on exhibition and Budget Information Sessions

Thanks to the community members who were able to attend one of the 6 budget information sessions held over the last two weeks across the Council area. Around 55 in total attended the sessions overall. Whilst it was a good chance to explain to the community the key elements of the proposed budget and plans for 2019/20 and beyond, it was also a great chance for staff and Councillors present, to be able to outline a brief summary of the enormous amount of work that has occurred, and is still occurring, right across the community.

There have been many projects delivered, and many underway, and of course, many still to be delivered across the next few years. On behalf of my fellow Councillors as we head into the end of another financial year, Id like to congratulate the staff and the many volunteers in groups and organisations in the community, who have assisted with the delivery of many of these projects and will continue to do so for current and future projects.

Staff and Councillors also took the chance after the presentation, to also learn of other priorities and requests from the community. Staff will summarise these queries and follow up on them where required. Some of the areas included from the Section 355 Committee representatives, who requested more communication and support, with some saying they still did not know who their Councillor delegate was. Staff have sent numerous emails and letters to inform them, so we will need to rethink that approach and ask the Councillors to contact the group directly and inform them of their phone and email address so they can be advised of when meetings are on. The committees also requested more involvement in projects, and some requested increased funding, for the Community assets they maintain and manage. Overall it was a great chance for the community to meet the new Directors and continue to engage with the Councillors.

Urana Heavy Vehicle Route

Thanks to the many community members who attended the Urana Bowling Club prior to the Budget session, to discuss the issues with the closure of Stephen Street to vehicles longer than 15 metres in late 2015. The Engineers will now consider the views presented and also work with Transport NSW and present further information to Council as different options are considered and the issues are considered further, and the differing community views. Further consultation will occur with the community going forward at relevant points.

Urana Oaklands Rand Morundah and Boree Creek Floodplain Management Project

Its good to know that a meeting was held on Wednesday 19 June, to continue on with this important project. I know these projects take time, but I am confident that the contractors are working well on gathering the information from the Flood Study, and continuing to work towards options to mitigate against any future floods in the towns that the plan covers. It is crucial that the community members and agencies on the committee continue to express their ideas based on their experience in the area.

Road works ahead!

With recent major announcements such as over \$5 million for Federation Way, and also over \$1 million for more works in and around Boree Creek for the Freight Link project, and a grant to replace the Doctors Road Bridge, you will be seeing plenty of road works occurring over the next financial year.

I hope you enjoy this months newsletter, including reading the many events that continue to be delivered across the district, and I look forward to seeing you at some of these no doubt over the next month and beyond.

BERNARD CALEO ROADSHOW & WORKSHOP INSPIRES

Federation Council Libraries celebrated Library and Information Week with a roadshow visiting local schools around the Council area with performer, comic book maker, and comic book communicator Bernard Caleo.

Comics, illustration, oratory and performance are his storytelling modes. Included in this is the art of Kamishibai.

Bernard demonstrated the art of Kamishibai to local school children from across the Council area. Kamishibai is a form of street theatre and storytelling that was popular during the time of the Depression of the 1930's and Post War period in Japan.

Bernard, in his performance, explained this traditional art form of Japanese storytelling and its influence on modern comics and anime.

General Manager Adrian Butler said the roadshow and workshop initiative was a fantastic example of Council's library staff engaging with local students to promote the importance of reading and drama. "Through drawing a story is born and Bernard definitely inspired some of Council's youngest residents to be creative and encouraged them to tell stories about their pictures. It was great to see the excitement and interest shown by the kids and teachers alike. We have some great natural born storytellers in Federation".

Library and Information Week, which was held from 20-26 May, provides an opportunity to promote the important role that libraries and information services play in research and education.

A total of ten sessions were held across the Council area in Corowa, Mulwala and Urana. Council would like to thank all the schools that participated in the roadshow and workshops in celebrating Library Information Week.

Federation Council respects and appreciates the unwavering support.



Construction of a new RV Park in the main street of Oaklands is now complete.

The project included;

- Major earth works with the carting of some 450 tonnes of road base for the preparation works.
- The preparation for a curb plinth with five parking bays for the RV vehicles.
- A gravel pathway leading from the park through to the swimming pool.
- Application of a 14 mm / 7mm bitumen seal over the area of excavated works and line marking.

Thanks are extended to the Oaklands Town Improvement Committee volunteers who played a big part in doing much of the early preparatory work for this site.

Council will now finalise a development application for the removal of the former RV buildings on the site.



RESTORING SIGNS AT ROYAL GEORGE

Disappearing signs at Royal George Hotel in Urana have been restored as part of Council's heritage works.

During the month it took to restore the signs, many locals stopped to chat to Mimi the heritage worker. One retired couple had not visited Urana for 50 years. They recalled that when television was introduced the first place to get one was the hotel. The people of Urana used to gather at the hotel to watch this new invention.

Owner Wayne Riley said, "It was always our intention to be involved in the development of Urana and be a positive influence within the community. Our hope was to bring help and support, utilising our building for accommodation and functions of a non-profit nature."

Council's Heritage Adviser Peter Kabaila, who supervised the work, described the project as a large mural canvas of historic signs; a piece of public art in Urana's heritage streetscape.

While many residents remember the hotel before the doors closed in the year 1999, its origins are much older.















Urana Courthouse volunteers researched historic photos and history of The Royal George. Its first known licensee was Amos George Warren in 1879. Photos show a handsome single storey building, later enlarged to one side. An upper storey was added in 1926. Its front wall is similar to the concrete construction of other postwar boom period Urana buildings. The colourful signs possibly date from the 1960s. John Dodds was the last licensee in 1993-99, after which the liquor license was moved for the Sydney Olympics.

MIMI - HERITAGE WORKER

Heritage work included the Corowa Silkworm Farm (as seen on left), stabilising some collapsed or broken cemetery monuments and restoring historic signs.

Mimi explained that indigenous mountain communities in her home country, Vietnam, each make a traditional gong which symbolises the strong spirit of their community.

She hoped that the gong could help call people to meetings or social gatherings.

To thank the Council for all its assistance with this year's heritage restoration work, heritage worker Mimi presented Council with a traditional gong.






